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Shibori — Bone Simple Design

Kanoko shibori is what is commonly thought of in the West as tie-dye. It involves binding certain sections of the cloth using thread — traditionally a type of untwisted thread known as shike-ito — to achieve the desired pattern. The pattern achieved depends on how tightly the cloth is bound and where the cloth is bound.

Arashi Shibori is a traditional Japanese technique used to dye fabrics. To dye fabric using this technique, you'll need a

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cylindrical object and some twine or yarn to tie the fabric down with. You can dye your fabric any color you'd like, and you can even mix and match different colors.

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Shibori Dyeing Techniques were a fad during the EDO period in Japan. It is the earliest cloth dyeing method, dates back to the 8th century.
